A rare extravagant event was graced by the acting Brazilian ambassador Mr. Fernando Figuera Mello and celebrity judges such as Mr. Marco Ndlovu (Base FM: Managing Director) amongst many others. A full programme also in cludes our local sensational traditional Nama dancers from the Jan Jonker Afrikaner High School. According to Dr. Wirlfed Isak April, the lecturer for Entrepreneurship, the purpose of this event is to educate the students and the public about the essence of food in both local and international business ventures. For some of the groups (such as Peru) this event really tested their faith whether they will be able to honour the commitment of passing their Industrial Psychology module, as this event was crucial for their continuous assessment evaluation of this semester. A reasonable number of staff, students and parents attended the event.

The judges narrowed the eleven participating team to four. Students who prepared the dishes from Peru, Morocco, United Arab Emirates, Brazil, Uganda and Iceland emerged as finalists. Each of these groups were required to do a two minute presentation to put their logical reasoning and thinking skills to the test. Iceland, Morocco and United Arab Emirates failed that test and Peru, Uganda and Brazil advanced to the final three.

The last three groups were required to dance and immediately conviced the judges why they should win the cash prize. The second runner up was Uganda (cash prize winners of N\$ 150), Brazil as first runner up (cash prize N\$ 200). The underdogs, Peru emerged as winners (cash prize winners of N\$ 450).

Dr. April commented that he was "extremely proud of my students and the people they are going to become in future".

A lot of thought, preparation and sleepless nights went into preparing this event, mostly from the sudents' side, he said. Dr. April would like to express his sincere appreciation and thanks to the judges, UNAM staff, students and the public for making this a memorable event.

UNAM's Maltas Club takes Green skills to Tsumkwe




Windhoek - The University of Namibia (UNAM) MALTAS Club with the help of Nedbank Namibia and NatureFriend Safaris, visited the youth of Tsumkwe to train and educate them on Green entrepreneurship and the importance of using solar energy.

According to Dr. Wilfred Isak April (founder of the MALTAS Club), the club teaches the youth how to identify entrepreneurial opportunities and use them to their advantage. "To put their theoretical skills to practice, the youth were required to bake bread in the solar stove to bake bread. While the communities of Tsumkwe experience tremendous power cuts the solar stove could be of great help to prepare meals, while engaging in other household tasks at the same time", says Dr. April.

The Club members went on a tour with the trainess to the Dein Pos Village on the outskirts of Tsumkwe. According to Ester Amuntenya from the UNAM

Dr. April says there is more to Namibia when "we dig deeper in our respective cultures and give a fresh perspective to the tourism sector on all we have to offer. We need to engage more with our ethnic groups and take entrepreneurship to the next level, because we really have a perfect mix. All of us have been given a gift, so share it".

Dr. April adds that the Tsumkwe community is facing a challenge of finding

a suitable market for its products and it needs the whole nation's assistance and support to market its product. In 2012/13 the Club visited Oshakati in the North, Uis in the West and Rietfontein in the East and they visited Stampriet in the South in 2014.

ho is Mathew Marcus?

I'm an entrepreneur and startup community builder. My goals in life are to become an entrepreneurial mentor, startup advisor, angel investor and eventually a professional philanthropist. I also enjoy surfing, traveling, yoga and the occasional game of poker.

Can Entrepreneurship really change the world and how?

Entrepreneurship has already changed the world, and continues to do so every day. If you think about it, everyone is an entrepreneur. We're born into this world with new thoughts and ideas, and as children we are constantly dreaming and inventing as we explore our new surroundings. Children think outside of the box all the time, which is one of the reasons they are so special. However, as we get older and enter the work force we're told to focus on "getting a job." This was the mindset for our elders for many generations. Work for someone else, get a paycheck, buy a house, have babies and live the "American Dream." But the younger generation of millennials is realizing that this isn't the dream for them. They want to continue to create, invent and build upon their own ideas and passions. It's not about the job anymore, but rather finding one's purpose in life and fueling it.

How is setting a business in Kansas City different compared to the rest of the USA and the world?

Kansas City is a fantastic place to start a company, whether it's a main street business or a startup. The low-cost of living and central location means you can live a comfortable lifestyle and quickly get to any other city in America, be it on the East or West coasts or somewhere in between. And there are a lot of smart people in Kansas City, which ensures that your business has a talent pool from which to find the best people to join your team. Furthermore, the energy in Kansas City is electric right now. There are many local projects, initiatives and organizations which are supporting entrepreneurs of all types. Together, they are helping Kansas City land such prestigious honors like the recent GEC Cities Challenge which named Kansas City as one of the Top 5 entrepreneurial cities in the world.

What makes Kansas City Village Start Up Unique from any other business in the world?


I think it's important to understand that the Kansas City Startup Village (KCSV) isn't a business, but more of a movement or living incubator. It started in late 2012 when serendipity brought a group of entrepreneurs together in the same part of KC. In the span of two weeks, three properties came online with startup activity within a half block of one another in the first neighborhood in the world to get Google Fiber. All without any planning. It has quickly grown over the last 2+ years, and we now have 30+ startups inhabiting 15+ properties. What makes it so special is that there is no organizational chart. No hierarchy. No president or CEO. The KCSV is co-lead by those who call it home. The KCSV is modeled from the guidelines shared by Brad Feld in his book, "Startup Communities." We are an all inclusive initiative where anyone can participate and do what they think is best to support and grow the community. Perhaps even more important is that we all support each other by sharing knowledge, answering questions, giving advice and feedback

and sharing the occasional hug when times are tough.

Any advice to aspiring entrepreneurs?

Don't try and do it alone. Would a climber try to ascend the peak of Mt. Everest alone? Absolutely not. She would enlist the help of a team of supporters which would offer her advice, guidance, supplies and resources along the way. The same can be said about entrepreneurship. It's often very difficult. The road is rife with twists and turns, ups and downs, and many unknowns. But, as the old proverb states, "If you want go fast, go alone. If you want to go far, go together." Plug into your local and regional startup community, and get to know the other entrepreneurs and key players. Over time, you will find they could be the biggest difference between success and failure, and they often turn out to be great friends. And remember, entrepreneurship is not about the destination. The journey is the reward.

An Issue of wanting it!

n 2010 the University of Namibia saw a graduate of theirs return from New Zealand as Dr. Wilfred Isak April. After taking up a position as a lecturer, he and a colleague, Mr. Petrus Erwee, formed the Management Leadership Talent Search (MALTAS) Club in 2011.

The club is meant to function as an incubator where academic excellence as well as entrepreneurial and leadership skills will find mentorship to develop at a maximum. April envisions students will exit the club as confident. engaging and independent drivers of change. He wishes to instill values of ownership, commitment and reliability above all. Sadly he has found that these ideals and commitment are often underdeveloped in students mainly because they don't know what it means to want something enough. And yet the students are otherwise talented and intelligent. Some even have darling personalities. But these characteristics are not enough to overcome challenges and to achieve success.

The most worrisome discovery April has made to date is that students don't know what they want. And when they claim they know, they don't show enough zeal to get it. Some perceive MALTAS as elicit club since students get the opportunity to travel and to go to flashy gala events. MALTAS students have visited places like Rosh Pinah and Tsumkwe, which the majority of Namibians have never been to.

They also had opportunities to visit countries such as Mauritius, Brazil and USA. But these trips should be regarded pointless if students did not also have their horizons broadenend to where they would conduct themselves in more "enlightened" ways. Since 2011 the intake for MALTAS

members had steadily declined from 25 to 10 students in 2014. The reason? Many students have had themselves dismissed from the club due to poor performance resulting from insufficient afford to the MALTAS as a time for grooming, which will require students to prioritise their academics first and MALTAS second.

According to April, people should not be deceived to assume that men automatically make better leaders than women. He has found male students to be as much capable of "falling pregnant" with matters of the heart or simply suffering from emotional immaturity and other character flaws that detract from their potential and existing strenghs. As much as both genders suffer from the same weaknesses, they also exhibit the same strengts of commitment and discipline - unfortunately not always consistently - hence the reduction of club members to work with.

April has made an interesting discovery with regards to his students' capacity to endure stress, exhibit integrity, and perform well. The parental home, he holds, can make or break a child. Home is the place where parents are supposed to groom their children into men and women of character. But often students do not get the type of mentorship they require to make decisions that will see them make a success of their lives. Saddest of all is parents who still want to sort out their children's problems - despite them studying to enter the job market where adults are supposed to conduct business. Many parents do not realise how this interference hampers children from maturing. When parents condone and allow poor behaviour, it is impossible for a child to develop discipline, because they are taught through example, that a lack of discipline bears no negative consequences. Yet, this has direct consequences in the adult world. When companies such as Gondwana Lodges, Wimpy, Nedbank, NatureFriend Safaris, Nam-Power, OTB and others thus extend a hand of friendship, it is important for April that the sudents also bring their share of mutual responsibility concerns the issue of students not simply expecting to receive everything for free. If you are offered a 90% discount somewhere, April believes, you should not complain about having to pay the 10%.

Not when it is an opportunity of a lifetime. You need to ask yourself if what you are achieving as a student, in your preparation for life, is enough. Do you need to cut down a little on your play-time such as TV and hanging out with the girls or watching Telemundo? Ask youself who you want to become and what you want to achieve. And take the opportunities available to you and reach your full potential.


The greatest physicist since Newton introduced a universe in which time, space and gravity are relative.

I still can't see how he thought of it, the physicist Richard Feynman once said of Albert Einstein's theory of general relativity, and whereas Feynman himself was no slouch in the brilliance department, it's easy to understand why he felt that way. Before Einstein, physicists thought of gravity as a force of attraction between two objects – as most laypersons think of it today.

Einstein showed instead that gravity is better understood as the idea that massive objects- stars for example create warps in an all - encompassing entity known as space- time, much as a cannonball depresses the surface of a trampoline. Roll a marble nearby and it spirals in, not because the cannonball pulls on it but simply because the marble gets trapped by the depression. It sounds bizarre, but Einstein's counterintuitive vision of gravity works better than Newton's to explain the motions of planets, stars and galaxies. Not bad for a young German Jew who couldn't find a teaching job after graduating from the Polytechnic Institute in Zurich, Switzerland, at the turn of the 20th century. Einstein ended up as a technical examiner for the Swiss parent office,

where he began thinking in depth about something he'd first wondered about at age 16. How would a beam of light appear if you could chase it at high velocity? Unlike what you'd see if you chased a speeding train, he eventually concluded, the speed of the light beam should appear to be exactly the same whether an observer is travelling towards or away from it. Starting from that premise, Einstein concluded that both time and motion are entirely relative, and that phrase "at rest" it meaningless. He further showed, with mathematical rigor, that nothing with mass can ever reach the speed of light (and that the light particles known as photons must be massless). Another implication: Matter and energy can be transformed, one into the other - the meaning of history's most famous equation: E = mc2. The paper he wrote on what he called the theory of special relativity, in 1905, made Einstein instantly famous - but another paper he wrote that year, on the so called photoelectric effect, was equally important: it provided a foundation for quantum theory. (Einstein would ultimately become dissatisfied with quantum physics because it implied a totally probabilistic universe, where some things could never be known.) He went on to publish the theory of general relativity in 1916, eventually

fleeing the Nazis along with other Jewish intellectuals and settling at the Institute for advanced Study, in Princeton, N.J. His last great idea, the unified theory, which he hoped would unify electromagnetism and gravity within a single theory, appeared to be misguided although its tenets are enjoying a renaissance today. In his later years, Einstein became better known to the public as a frizzy-haired, sad-eyed, grandfatherly pacifist. To scientists, however, he will always be a world-class revolutionary – the man who left Feynman and the greatest physicists of the 20th century shaking their heads in awe.

Tell us about yourself?

I have worked in tourism since I graduated with my undergraduate degree. Is self employment really the answer for Namibian youth and why?


